

Dr. Grace Ryan is an Assistant Professor in Preventive and Behavioral Medicine at UMass Chan. As a behavioral scientist, she conducts mixed-methods and communityengaged research aimed at designing and implementing evidence-based approaches to health promotion in underserved community and clinical settings. Much of her research focuses on adolescent vaccination and she leads work to address widespread urbanrural inequities in uptake of vaccines. She was recently funded through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to lead the ARISe Center for Rural Vaccination at UMass Chan; this project will focus on addressing vaccine hesitancy across the lifespan in rural New England communities.

On October 10, 2024, Vermont lost a passionate advocate, a dedicated leader, and a beloved former colleague. David Cranmer, a cancer survivor himself, was a founder and former coordinator of VTAAC and the cocreator of the Vermont Cancer Survivor Network. Through his tireless efforts, he transformed the lives of countless cancer survivors across the state.

David led VTAAC for over 12 years, shaping the Vermont Cancer Plan through three successful cycles. His goal was simple: to help one cancer survivor every day. And he

did just that—always with compassion, commitment, and a deep sense of purpose.

Beyond his work, David had a joyful spirit. Whether playing guitar, participating in Revolutionary War reenactments, or enjoying road trips in his PT Cruiser, David lived life fully and spread that energy to all who knew him.

David's legacy lives on in the lives he touched and the community he built. He will be deeply missed, but his impact will be felt for years to come. Our thoughts are with his family and all who were fortunate enough to know him.

Year 2 Evaluation Report

Vermont Comprehensive Cancer Control Program

The evaluation of the Vermont Comprehensive Cancer Control (CCC) included 3 major activities.

- 1. A **survey of sunscreen dispenser recipient sites** to understand the implementation and effectiveness of the Vermont Community Sunscreen Dispenser Program.
- 2. Facilitated conversations for development of the VTAAC



Cancer Survivorship Resource Center, with resources for cancer patients and survivors, caregivers, and families.

3. Development of a **reporting tool for tracking VTAAC taskforce progress**, as well as an annual taskforce co-lead reflection tool to understand taskforce functioning.

Together, the evaluation efforts in Year 2 provided useful and action-oriented findings regarding the implementation of evidence-based interventions (EBIs) and Cancer Plan implementation progress tracking. Key partners were engaged in the evaluation in multiple ways, including the design of data collection procedures, meaning-making of preliminary results, and discussion of findings to use for programmatic decision-making.

National Lung Cancer Screening Day




National Lung Cancer Screening Day (NLCSD) was Saturday, November 9, 2024. This was the third annual NLCSD to raise awareness about lung cancer screening and to reduce access barriers by hosting a screening day on a Saturday.

Northwestern Medical Center, Southwestern Vermont Medical Center, and UVM Medical Center participated in Vermont. The American Cancer Society, 802Quits and VTAAC partnered with these sites to offer additional resources for the event. All screening sites hosted full Saturday clinics, accommodating patients who might otherwise have been unable to schedule a weekday appointment.

VTAAC partners also shared lung cancer screening messaging out throughout

Project ECHO and Patient Navigation Component



VTAAC received funds for July 2024 - June 2025 to implement a Rural Cancer Survivorship Project ECHO and Patient Navigation component to improve the health and wellness of cancer survivors in rural communities.

The goal of Project ECHO is to improve and increase medical and social supports to survivors in rural areas by providing education on the needs and issues faced by rural cancer survivors. VTAAC is working with UVM AHEC to plan and conduct telementoring sessions with primary teams (primary care) and will host six sessions starting in March 2025.

The Quality of Life Taskforce and the Physical Activity and Nutrition in Cancer Survivors Project are working together to

November in honor of Lung Cancer Awareness Month utilizing messaging that the **Dartmouth Cancer Center** created for a previous collaborative campaign.



Southwestern Vermont Medical Center (SVMC) is launching a pilot RN-led Cancer Survivorship Program, led by Rebecca Hewson-Steller. The program will support cancer survivors who have completed treatment at the Cancer Center and returned to their primary care providers. SVMC will contact these survivors at regular intervals to check in and offer resources as needed.

Beyond the Diagnosis: Integrating Trauma-Informed Approaches in Cancer Care

The National Behavioral Health Network for Tobacco and Cancer Control (NBHN) is excited to announce their new Extension for Community Healthcare Outcomes (ECHO) series, Beyond the Diagnosis: Integrating Trauma-informed Approaches in Cancer Care. ECHO is a collaborative model of education and care management that helps professionals provide expertlevel care and education wherever they live.

The intersection of trauma and cancer care has emerged as a critical area of focus in comprehensive cancer control efforts. Alongside ECHO faculty and subject-matter experts, participants will learn about the basics of trauma-informed care (TIC) principles and how to implement them across the cancer care continuum. In five 90-minute sessions from January-May 2025, participants will focus on creating opportunities to integrate TIC principles and support mental wellbeing through their cancer prevention and control efforts.

This ECHO is open to people who work in cancer care, cancer centers, clinicians and their teams.
